HB62 SENT TO THE GOVERNOR

CORRECTIONS - Amends awarding of extra good time for participation in certified treatment and rehabilitation programs (EG DECREASE GF EX See Note): provide for ten (10) extra days per month, not to exceed 540 total days for any inmate satisfactorily completing certified rehabilitation programs, and workforce development for inmates.

HB368 (ACT 162)

SALES/TOBACCO TRADE - Provides relative to smoking tobacco and smoking tobacco products sold from self-service displays (EN DECREASE GF RV See Note): prohibits all tobacco product displays and sales in front of sales counters to avoid direct contact by youth.

HB462 (ACT 185)

CORRECTIONS - Amends reentry program provisions (EN NO IMPACT GF EX See Note): provides for adding entrepreneurship and life skills training as part of certified re-entry programs for inmates.

HB563 SENT TO THE GOVERNOR

TAX/AD VALOREM TAX - Provides relative to ad valorem taxes (EN SEE FISC NOTE LF RV See Note): provides for alternative bid processes, and allows governing authority to set property sale price after public tax sale.

HB582 SENT TO THE GOVERNOR

DISTRICTS/DOWNTOWN DEVEL - Changes the boundaries of the Shreveport Downtown Development District: expands the boundary by which the downtown development authority has jurisdiction.

HB730 ASSIGNED TO HOUSE APPROPRIATIONS

BUDGETARY CONTROLS - Places restrictions on actions taken to avoid a budget deficit: never scheduled by committee chair.

HB871 ASSIGNED TO HOUSE WAYS & MEANS

Considered on 5/19/2009

(Meeting Adjourned)

TAX/INCOME-CREDIT - Increases the tax credit for rehabilitation of certain owner-occupied residential or mixed use structures (OR DECREASE GF RV See Note): This bill was amended into SB 113 by Sen. Marrioneaux to provide for increased tax credits, and added federal HUB zone areas to be affected by this legislation.

To say the least, this has been one of the most challenging legislative sessions yet, since my coming to Baton Rouge. With an approximate \$1.3 billion dollar budget deficit, a governor vying for higher aspirations, and a young, inexperienced legislature trying to find its own political footing, it could have been worse. Barely were we able to stay the course.

Partisanship at its highest level sometimes seemed to permeate the local ranks. The constant mantra of "no fees—no new taxes" was the order of the day. Proposing business tax credits, although important, as a means of promoting economic development has become almost epidemic. A continuation of this form of tax exempt welfare to the public and private sectors will eventually result in empty state coffers with no general funds to provide needed public services.

I have yet to get plausible administrative data justifying the amount of business tax credits issued versus the number of jobs and amount of wealth created as a direct result. This political form of welfare appears to operate on an honesty basis—likely one that can't continue.

Personally, I am somewhat pleased with the legislation we passed this regular session, but our toughest days are still on the horizon. - Roy A. Burrell, State Representative, District 2

MANAGEMENT POSITION DESCRIPTIONS

LOCAL CENSUS OFFICE MANAGER
Manages the Local Census Office activities and operations with the support for the Dallas Regional Census Center to ensure execution of all operational functions, resources and personnel.

ASSISTANT MANAGER FOR FIELD OPERATIONS
Responsible for accomplishing production and quality goals in field operation under their span of control. Supervises 10-15 supervisors and indirectly supervises 400-600 field employees at peak operation. Coordinates staff training, creates work assignments, monitors progress, and reassigns work as needed.

ASSISTANT MANAGER FOR ADMINISTRATION
Manages all personnel payroll, supply requisitioning, office security and safety and other administrative activities. Supervises up to 10 clerks and shift supervisors.

ASSISTANT MANAGER FOR RECRUITING
Manages all recruitment and hiring to support field and office operations for the Local Census Office. Trains and supervises field recruiting assistants and clerks office clerks.

ASSISTANT MANAGER FOR QUALITY ASSURANCE
Advices the Assistant Manager for Field Operations and Local Census Office Manager on compliance with pre-established quality assurance goals and procedures for all field data collection operations. Acts as principal technical advisor on quality assurance aspects of field data collection operations in the Local Census Office.

ASSISTANT MANAGER FOR TECHNOLOGY
Responsible for managing information functions in the Local Census Office. This job involves coordinating, duties and resources, analyzing, and coordinating information operations to efficiently support Local Census Office functions.
